Yorke Dyer began life with a distinct advantage.

He was born in February, the month when great men are born. And even though his life didn't take a political turn as did Washington's and Lincoln's, he has proven successful in an entirely different field.

In 1928 when he came to Oak Harbor he established Dyer's Cash and Carry store, which in 1930 was chosen as one of the 25 most efficiently operated grocery stores throughout the nation. This survey, taken through the grocer's magazine to determine managing efficiency, showed that in good management the small-town store can compete successfully with chain stores and larger concerns

Before Dyer started the store, he was employed for five years by the Standard Oil Company at Hood's Canal. He lived on Whidby Island during school years from the age of 6 to 19. His birthplace was Ketchikan, Alaska where he was born February 28, 1896.

He came to Whidby Island at the age of two years and after moving to Seattle where he lived two years, returned here and attended school at Coupeville and San de Fuca. He attended the University of Washington for two years. In 1917 Dyer joined the navy and although he did not see action, he saw a good part of the world, travelling through almost the entire eastern hemisphere.

"About the most adventure I've had during my life is travel," Dyer said. "While in the navy we went through the Mediterranean, Black Sea, Red Sea, saw Turkey, Egypt, the pyramids, etc."
